INTRODUCTION:

The workshop started by 9:30am with a Christian prayer. After a short devotion was hold and the message was brought by Rev. Alex Bob- Karimu with the scripture taken from Mathew 5:verse 14 to16 . It captured peace, love, care and service to one another, to our community and societies everywhere.

The workshop participants where drawn from various colleges, Institutions with reflection of Gender balance. It drawn a population of over nine (9) Institutions around the country. The workshop started by self introduction of all present. These includes SCM –SL officials, workers and the regional secretary of world student Christian Federation. Later Rev. Karimu introduced Bro. Desmond George Williams as facilitator of the work, Rev.Arnold Archer Campbell ex-chairman of SCM-SL and other dignitaries from the Methodist church Sierra Leone. In his statement Rev. Arnold Archer Campbell was quick to talk about benefits in the movement and stated how some had benefited in the past including himself through studies, conferences etc. He made known that he is presently studying about elections and therefore would be engaging the youths of Sierra Leone through educational programs about the 2012 general elections.

Thereafter, he joined Rev. Bob-karimu to present Georgine Kengne Djeutane, World Student Christian Federation regional secretary from Nairobi,\Kenya, who in their words was in the country to see to it that SCM-SL is revived and hence formally relaunched . On his part, Rev. Karimu thanked Georgine for the great effort she made in seeing to it that she came over to oversee the relaunching of the movement in Sierra Leone. He paid cognizance to the participants and hoped that all will participate and enjoy the program.

RELAUNCHING OF SCM-SL

The relaunching of Student Christian movement Sierra Leone was stated by Georgine Kengne Djeutane. In her relaunching statement, she started by welcoming and recognizing the presence of all present. She particularly endorsed the effort of Rev. Alex Karimu together with his team for their diligent to revive SCM-SL. Also, she thanked them for the great hospitality they have accorded her since her arrival in the country.

She then went ahead and gave a brief background of World Student Christian Federation. She mentioned that the Movement started with six people in 1865 with the main aim of teaching and spreading Peace around the world especially among the youths. That the organization is now operating in six regions of the world including Africa, with its headquarter in Nairobi, Kenya. And that presently it has 105 Movement across the world with the following mandate:

- To Advocate for fearer world.
- To promote Peace and Justice globally.
- Work for change of people and societies.
- Train young people in skills.
- Work to address poverty.
- Educate to know the issues .
- Address the issues to prevent poverty.

She further stated that the World Student Christian Federation secretariat is in Geneva, Switzerland . The federation tried to change the world through student activism which makes up of a significant number of the world population in the youth bracket. To this end, she mentioned several cases where youths were involved both as perpetrators and victims of conflicts i.e. the Kenya elections, southern Sudan, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Ivory Coast and recently Libya but regretted to state that these conflicts are sometimes fueled as a result of the rich resources Africa has in abundance.

By way of helping to remedy the conflicts and problems in Africa, she stated that we must engage in advocacy work so as to reduce the conflicts and other related problems. She mentioned Mrs. Helen Johnson Shirleaf, the Liberia President as someone because she believed in the objects of World Student Christian Federation, founded the Liberia Student World Movement for the furtherance of similar goal.

In her concluding speech, she officially relaunched the Student Christian Movement of Sierra Leone.

THE WORKSHOP FACILITATOR

Mr. Desmond George Williams was presented to the house by Rev. Alex Karimu to commence the workshop. Mr. Williams also took the opportunity to welcome and thank Georgine for her effort to grace the occasion. He wished her a faithful stay during the short visit.

He started the workshop with Pre-test which he said were not meant to test the ability of people but rather to provoke their interest for active participation in the session so both test one and two were done in the form of questions and answers. Test one demanded answers like true or false as indicated below:

- That all conflicts can be solved. All answered false/ majority.
- That all conflicts results in death. Majority said true.
- That conflicts is about disagreement. Majority said true.
- Only women and children suffered in conflicts. Majority said true.
- Conflict are about resources. Majority said false
- Elders play a major role in settling conflicts in Africa. Majority said true.
- One can have conflict within himself or herself. All said true.
- Conflict resolution is new in Africa. Majority said true
- Youth are used as a pond in conflict. All said true

As a recap to previous session of pre-test are the following answers were provided by Mr. Desmond George Williams the facilitator from 1-10

In exercise two, participants were asked to substitute words for both conflict and peace. For conflict, the facilitator endorse words like disagreement, dispute, bad, division, dismay, cruel uprising, disability, disobedient, death, rebelling, dissatisfaction etc As for peace some of the words included harmony, love, good, unity, calmness, Godly, happiness, stability, development, laughter, obedience, love, joy, life, achievement, success and justice.

At this juncture, we were made to understand that not all conflict are destructive. He stated that so long as certain conflicts are destructive yet some has positive consequences which are mentioned below:

- ❖ Change
- ❖ Stability
- ❖ Peace
- ❖ Transparency
- ❖ Accountability
- ❖ Justice
- ❖ Better understanding
- ❖ Development

This took us to the origin of conflict.

ORIGIN OF CONFLICT

Mr, Desmond George Williams stated that conflict came from the Greek word “Confligene” to rub against as incompatibility. Hence, conflict have opportunity and the danger parts. He compared it to the snake poison which can ill and cure, fire which can destroy and can be used food as well as the Cutlass. it can be used to cultivate and likewise used to chop off hands and limbs. He sited the cases of Adam and Eve, Cain and Abel in the light of the Bible.

LEVELS OF CONFLICTS AND PEACE

He mentioned here that peace and conflict within oneself is Intra and between parties is referred to as Inter thus:

Intra	peace
Intra	conflict
Inter	peace
Inter	conflict

However, he emphasis that peace within us is crucial and one cannot give what he or she has not get. For that matter, he sited the famous prayer of St. Francis of Assisi “Lord let there be peace in the world and let it begin within me”

At this juncture, he pointed the distinction between Intra- personal peace and Inter personal peace.

- ❖ Intra personal peace being the peace within oneself which St. Francis of Assisi esteemed in his prayer for world peace.
- ❖ Where as the Inter personal peace is peace between yourself and the next person. So it is obvious that peace and conflict is operative at Inter-personal level involving group, domestic setting and community. With this, he summarized by giving few examples of the intra and Inter personal conflict case.
- ❖ Intra – group conflict
- ❖ Intra – state conflict i.e. RUF and the Government of Sierra Leone

- ❖ Inter – state conflict i.e. the Yenga issue and Bakasi.
- ❖ Inter-continental
- ❖ Inter- personal conflict i.e. domestic
- ❖ Inter-group – musical groups conflicts between artist groups within the country.

POSITIVE PEACE AND NEGATIVE PEACE

He stated that peace is the absent of war but certain peace can be negative, and hence negative peace is superficial. Meaning that those elements that will enhance or promote the peace are lacking, for example Human rights, no freedom of speech, no freedom of movement, no justice system, poor welfare services, disregard for rule of law, neglect of graft etc. this particular topic generate lots of interest among the participants and many contributions were made.

GENESIS OF CONFLICT

That there are stages of conflict which are identified below:

The pre-conflict stage otherwise referred to as material gathering stage which are malice, grievances, disgruntleness and dissatisfaction. This give birth to the talent stage of the conflict. The conflict become latent when it to boiling point and ready to spark out at any time. Conflict manifest is where the conflict come out in the open. In political situation killing, fighting, burning of properties, rapping are done without any regret. And often times International partners come in to help bring peace through cease fire agreement and signed peace treaties.

METHODS OF HANDLING CONFLICTS

The following are prescribed to handle conflicts:

- ❖ Dialogue
- ❖ Mediation
- ❖ Compromise
- ❖ Reconciliation
- ❖ Tolerance
- ❖ Negotiation

Other means will be the use of force, litigation, adjudication and arbitration. From the above, any method use will result to one of these below:

- ❖ Win/win
- ❖ Win/lose
- ❖ Lose/lose

However, we saw that the internally agreed peace will last longer than the externally settled own to the fact the former resulted through compromise and reconciliation. Whereas the latter as a result of imposition by external factor.

In regard what action we take to prevent conflicts, several good answers came from the audience/ participants but the facilitator stated that at the mutual hurting statements. That is when both parties would have exhausted themselves. He also stated that force can be used as a means to end conflicts. For example student demonstration. Again he said that the two parties of conflict can bargain to reach peaceful settlement. But emphasis that the root cause of conflicts should be unearthed in the process of resolving every conflict. Hence conflict resolution is about conflicting parties coming to the original point before the conflict.

GROUP WORK

The workshop participants were divided in three groups to work on the causes of conflicts in Africa. Each group had a chairman to guide the group and a secretary to take minutes and make presentation in chronological order of the causes by gravity.

GROUPS

The following causes for conflicts in Africa were stated:

- ❖ Poverty
- ❖ Corruption
- ❖ Marginalization
- ❖ Tribal and religious differences
- ❖ Political power
- ❖ Inequitable distribution of resources
- ❖ Gender bias

GROUP ONE

CAUSES OF CONFLICT BY ORDER OF PRIORITY:

- ❖ Power
- ❖ Politics
- ❖ Money
- ❖ Resources
- ❖ Selfishness/greed
- ❖ Poverty
- ❖ Jealousy
- ❖ Polygamy

GROUP TWO

CAUSES ACCORDING TO PRIORITY

- ❖ Power
- ❖ Resources (Minerals property)
- ❖ Injustice
- ❖ Religious (Muslims and Christians)
- ❖ Inter family conflict
- ❖ Tribal
- ❖ Greed and Selfishness
- ❖ Negligence of people's needs
- ❖ Territorial conflict

In terms of tribal conflict the case of Rwandan between the Hutus and Tutsis was sighted. Whereas religion was mentioned as a factor for the unrest in Nigeria between the Muslims and Christians. On the other hand, it was noted that conflicts occur at different levels such as domestic, national, regional and international.

The group work which marked the end of the day one of the workshop was proceeded with launch (food and drinks). The catering appreciable and sufficient.

DAY TWO OF THE WORKSHOP

The workshop started with the usual devotion which was led by Rev. Alex Karimu. In his message, he spoke on peace and encourage all asundry to be ambassadors of peace in their communities and everywhere they go. He stressed that peace making and peace building has direct connection with heaven, such that God love the peace maker and has a place in heaven. Therefore, he called on all to be touch bearers for peace and the peace of the world particularly the peace of Sierra Leone.

He made participants realize that various means can be used to propagate the message of peace, one being through songs and music. He then prayed for resources as he revealed about the new peace album he is working on for use to preach peace and tolerance throughout the 2012 General Elections period. He thrilled participants with a short “**ACCAPELLA**” demonstration of one of the songs from the album.

INTERACTIVE SESSION BY GEORGINE KENGNE DJEUTANE

The aim of this session was to promote interaction so as to enhance understanding and familiarization among the workshop participants through a specific activity. The activity called on each participant to come to the front and attempt to adequately address two questions to the listening audience. The same questions were treated by all. This exercise further requested that one should state a letter that he/she like which represent a particular character and that will eventually be the new name of the person.

The questions are stated below:

1. What flower or tree do you like and why?
2. What do you want to be? Or what are your dreams for tomorrow?

Sister Georgine set the stage by starting the exercise. In so doing, she told the audience tree or flowers she like and the reason for it. Sincerely, she explained what she want to be in line with her dreams and hence the new name dynamic which is represented by Djeutane. This exercise was another high point and it prompted every participants to participate in it. As such, many new names came up to mention a few:

Thereafter, the facilitator was presented by Rev. Alex Karimu to participants. Mr. Desmond George- Williams in his remark stated that he was delighted by the enthusiasm of workshop participants and encouraged them to remain committed to the Movement even when the workshop is ended. He called on participants to be focus and stay attentive as we enter in the last day of the workshop.

To this end, he asked some few participants to recap what they understood from the previous day session. He was satisfied with the performance of those who volunteered. He then went ahead to recap previous day pre-test one at the start of the workshop as stated on page – in this report

CAUSES OF CONFLICT

The causes are responsible factor which include the primary, the secondary and Tertiary. The primary is the main cause of the conflict; and what develop of the primary is the secondary cause, whereas tertiary cause is the immediate cause that spark the conflict. Example of a tertiary cause of conflict was when the barter system or business trade between the Sierra Leone and the Liberian soldiers at the boarder resulted to suspicion of cheating sparked off the civil conflict in Sierra Leone on 23rd March, 1991.

EFFECTS OF CONFLICTS IN AFRICA

Conflicts in Africa accounts for the following effects:

1. Women suffered as double victims
2. Women used as sex slaves
3. Fruitful conscription of youths and children into the outfit
4. Destruction of lives and properties
5. Plundering of resources
6. Reducing the active population
7. Misuse of children and youths
8. Slow down of development
9. Human trafficking

These can be verified in the TRC report of Sierra Leone.

ROOT CAUSES OF CONFLICTS IN AFRICA

Mr. Williams stated that all conflicts has causes. They are as follows:

1. The legacy of European colonization
2. Unequal international trade
3. Cold war by proxy
4. Greed and grievance
5. Ethnicity and religion
6. Political corruption
7. Lack of respect for rule of law (law & order)
8. Human rights violations
9. Injustice
10. Nepotism
11. Graft
12. Inequitable

METHODS OF CONFLICT RESOLUTION

The following are key in conflict resolution:

1. Negotiation
2. Mediation

Negotiation: Representatives of conflicting parties will engage to reach peaceful settlement of the crisis. Each will present a position and sometime a definite one moral guarantors are involved in extremely high political conflict hence the need for caucusing to control the process.

Mediation: Helping to bring reach between conflicting parties by generally accepted person.

CHARACTERISTICS OF MEDIATOR

A: Mediator shall be:

1. Calm
2. Unbiased
3. Sincere
4. Truthful
5. Good listener
6. Respectful
7. Respected
8. Wise

PRELIMINARY THINGS TO DO BEFORE MEDIATING

1. Secure appropriate environment
2. Be there in time
3. Guarantee/assure confidentiality
4. Ensure that the victims are relaxed
5. Thank them for coming before introducing the mediation process

THE MEDIATION PROCESS

1. Types –power mediation and pure mediation
2. Thirty party interviewer
 - ❖ Negotiating with muscle
 - ❖ Powerful/powerless mediator

PEACE BUILDING

Peace building is about the process of destroying the PILLARS of war and constructing the pillars of peace. This brought us to the end of last topic for the workshop. At this stage, participants were divided into groupings for the last group work on “How can young Christians consolidate peace in Sierra Leone”

After about forty minute of brainstorming in various groups, secretaries of the groups made their presentations accordingly by.

GROUP 1

1. Peace with yourself
2. You should be an example
3. Workshops at grass root level
4. Peace rallies preaching peace targeting the people of Makeni and Bo using banners, hand bills and T-shirts.
5. Concert –composing songs in different languages. The use of drama and film shows focusing on the disabled as well.
6. Education
7. Counseling for trauma healing
8. Care for abandoned children who are succeeding generation

GROUP 2

1. Avoid violence
2. Forum for peace campaigned peace education
3. Work with God and pray always for other and the nation
4. Create alliances in churches and in the communities
5. Encourage others rather than condemn or discriminate against them for their belief or religion
6. Use drama and plays to preach peace
7. Be an example or role model
8. Be an ambassador of peace

GROUP 3:

1. Creating employment
2. Sensitization through youth activities like drama, seminars to propagate peace.
3. Justice sector involvement
4. Orienting the minds for peace
5. Educational training
6. Establishing communities for settling family and tribal disputes
7. Creating youth networks in churches to spread peace to communities and secretaries everywhere.

Maintaining inter personal peace as a Christian man or woman.

HOW DO WE PROMOTE THE ORGANISATION

Now that the organization was relaunched the way forward to revitalizing it formed climax of the two day workshop. In so doing a democratic process was executed to foster a decision of fairness for all matters that were discussed.

MEETINGS

It was agreed that a general meeting will be held on every last Friday of the month, starting 5pm-6pm at a venue that will be appropriate and acceptable by the general membership. In this regard, Freetown was divided into East zone at Wellington represented by Emmanuel K. Kborie, and Josephine Kai Tongie, Central zone represented by Samuel Babatunde Thomas and the West zone represented by sister Kula Sillah

Also, it was agreed that all colleges whether leaving in or out of Freetown should have their individual college meetings through Campus representative, on third Friday of every month so that they will be able to communicate the details to the general meeting board in Freetown.

FUNDRAISING

It was noted that money is the engine that will help further our activities and also with the realization of the goal of this organization in Sierra Leone. Further noting the importance of this fact, Rev. karimu asked participants to think thoroughly about strategies that would help to enhance our fundraising effort, and bring those ideas at the general and college meetings separately. In this connection then, the next general meeting was scheduled for 26th November 2011 in the East zone at St Martin Church in Freetown.

PLANNING

Again, it was agreed that activities of the organization will be planned on quarterly basis and where necessary for all the regions.

CLOSING COURTESY

SCM-SL recognizing the good work of sister Georgine Djeutane for the World Student Christian Federation; noting her kindness to officials of SCM-SL to ensure that the organization is revived

Further noting her encouragement and effort in coming over to Sierra Leone to actualize the relaunching of the Movement, pleased SCM-SL to ask upon sister Christine to present her the specially prepared wooden carve with inscriptions representing her full name as a token for remembrance

In response, she stated that she was very pleased by kind consideration of members of SCM-SL. Therefore, extended her heart felt gratitude to all and to Rev. Alex Karimu in particular for the warm welcome and hospitality accorded her so far. In an emotionally charged mood, she disclosed that she will be living the Nairobi secretariat in 2012. But stated that she will do all she could to support the movement in Sierra Leone through her successor. she closed with a short word of encouragement/exaltation from the book of psalm and prayed for SCM-SL and Rev. Alex Karimu.

The Mediation Process

- **STAGE 1: Introducing the process**
- Welcome parties and thank them for coming
- Clarify the roles (mediator/co mediator, participants)
- Establish ground rules
- Describe process
- **Stage 2: Identify the issues**
- Get parties to tell their stories
- Assist them to identify core issues
- Get agreement on the key issues
- Engage parties to set the agenda. Which issue first
- Summarise the parties perspectives noting areas of consensus and disagreement

The Mediation Process

- **Stage 3: Problem solving exchange**
- Ensure each party understands what the other has said and how they feel: clarify and ensure understanding of any new information shared.
- Develop areas of potential movement
- Apply win/win negotiating principles by encouraging both parties to speak to each other.
- Encourage a move towards resolution
- **Stage 4: Building Agreement**
- Invite parties to make proposals and encourage them to generate a range of options
- Assist in evaluation of options
- Encourage problem solving and guide them towards an agreement that incorporates the needs of both.

- There have recently been numerous civil wars and conflicts going in Africa,
- No less than 28 Sub-Saharan African states have been at war since 1980

- Over nine million refugees and IDPs
- Death toll in DRC one thousand times more than in Israel/Palestine conflict
- Angola has seen an estimated 500,000 people killed since 1989 and an estimated 3 million refugees

Effects of conflicts on Women and Girls

- *“I want to see a country where girls are not left out, but are encouraged to reach the highest peak of their potential.” – Ms Chinsia Caesar*
- Atrocities women face: killing, rape, sexual violence, sexual slavery, slave labour, abduction, assault, amputation, forced pregnancy, disembowelment of pregnant women, torture, trafficking, mutilation, theft and the destruction of property.
- TRC Report: Out of the 10,002 adult victims, 33.5 per cent were female.
- Women suffer double victimization, compelled to join the armed forces, and victimized by society.
- Rape and sexual violence during the war, created a sharp rise in cases of HIV/AIDS and other sexually transmitted infections,
