I. INTRODUCTION

The World Student Christian Federation (WSCF) was founded on the 17th to the 19th of August 1895 in Vadstena, Sweden. WSCF was founded with the aim of uniting movements or associations of Christian students throughout the world. The WSCF is a global community of Student Christian Movements committed to dialogue, ecumenism, social justice and peace. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, the WSCF is called to be prophetic witness in Church and Society. It also seeks to promote cooperation among young people in working and advocating for socio-economic justice, peace, human rights and responsible and accountable leadership in the world.

WSCF provides a forum for Christian formation, witness, ministry and ecumenical dialogue across culture, gender and race. It does so through engaging students in study and analysis of social, political and economic issues and action from an informed Christian perspective.

Our mission is to empower students in critical thinking and constructive transformation of our world by being a space for: Prayer and celebration, Theological reflection, Study and analysis of social, economic and cultural processes and Solidarity and action across boundaries of culture, gender and ethnicity.

In a bid to achieve our goal, WSCF Africa Region in 2007 carried out 3 trainings: HIV and AIDS link to Economic Justice, HIV and AIDS Overcoming Stigmatisation and Discrimination and the Training of Female Trainers in Gender Advocacy Policy and Leadership. In addition to these 3 trainings, a theological reflection on Migration was prepared and sent to our members for in-depth analysis. In collaboration with the SCM of Nigeria, our Daily Scripture Reading was also produced for the spiritual growth of our members. We also worked hand in hand with other Ecumenical bodies and other Civil Society organization to address the economic and social injustices.

We are inviting you to read our activities report and to join us in prayer and action for the constructive transformation of our world.

II. GOVERNANCE

1. Officers and Staff meeting - Geneva

From the 8th -14th of February 2007, we held a staff and officers meeting in Geneva. The meeting gives opportunity to staffs to share global and regional reports. The officers and staff meeting was a great opportunity where a space is provide for information sharing,

deepening knowledge and new skills, to discuss operational issues more than governance, staff sharing on operational level, strengthening common vision, sharing with colleagues hopes, stresses and building sense of community and solidarity.

2. World Executive Committee meeting – Alexandria, Egypt

The World Executive Committee meeting was hosted by the Middle East Region and took place in Alexandria, Egypt from the 1st- 8th of June 2007. WSCF leaders gathered in Egypt to steer the federation global work and encounter the churches culture and history of Egypt. During the Executive Committee Meeting, global policies are put in place. This Exco in addition to other issues on the agenda, focused on the preparation of the next General Assembly which is schedule to take place in Toronto Canada in 2008.

III. ACTIVITIES

1. Bible Study and Theology

Through the 2008 Daily Scripture Reading, we are offering to our members Bible quotations where they can find strength; help to enrich their faith and not to be destroyed by their suffering. In today's darkness we are encouraging you to come more and more closer to God and hear Him telling you that you are not alone, others have walked where you are walking and have lived to tell the story of God's faithfulness and love. What should we do at a time like this not to be frightened or scared, but to persevere through the incredible riches God has planned for us? We are called to be LIKE AN EAGLE. In the Bible, the Eagle is referred to for its swiftness of flight, its mounting high in the air, setting its nest in high places ((Deut 28: 49, Deut 32; 11-13; Job 29:30; 2 Sam1:23). The Eagle is the symbol of power and courage.

It is said that the eagle sheds his feathers in the beginning of spring, and with fresh plumage assumes the appearance of youth. Let us like the eagle "not be conformed to the patterns of this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God". Rom12:2. One theological reflection on Migration and human trafficking was also prepared by Rev Okoro Ejike, former WSCF Chairperson in English and translated in French. It was sent to our SCM and WSCF members.

2. Inter-regional Leadership Training on Migration

The Interregional Leadership training on Migration organized by the Inter Regional Office (IRO) took place from the 12-21 September in Mexico City. Participants in this programme undertook research about migration and responses to migration in their context. The SCM of Cote d'Ivoire and AJEC – SCM in DRC – Lubumbashi were to represent Africa at this forum. Unfortunately only a member of AJEC was present at the leadership training. You can read more on the fantastic outcomes of the training in the Federation News of November 2007.

3. HIV and AIDS Economic Justice Training – Accra – Ghana

The World Student Christian Federation HIV&AIDS and Economic Justice Platform Training Workshop took place in Accra, Ghana from 24th to 28th September 2007.

The workshop was attended by WSCF officials, member students of WSCF, two facilitators as well as collaborating organizations drawn from Western, Central and Eastern Africa. Participating countries included: Benin, Cameroon, Cote d'Ivoire, Ghana, Kenya, Liberia, Nigeria, Sierra Leone and Togo.

The aim of the workshop was to enable WSCF to establish an effective economic justice advocacy framework for its response to HIV&AIDS pandemic, by empowering WSCF members to plan for undertaking advocacy work focusing on HIV&AIDS and economic injustice issues.

Specific objectives of the workshop were as follows:

- To deepen knowledge of WSCF members and build their individual skills in developing and implementing plans and strategies for undertaking policy advocacy for HIV&AIDS and Economic Justice.
- To demonstrate how HIV&AIDS pandemic can be resolved through economic justice
- To strengthen a coalition of Ecumenical Youth movements to advocate for the critical issues of Economic Justice and HIV&AIDS.

At the end of the very successful training, delegates from each national movement drew a national plan of action to ensure continued success of the objectives. In addition to the statement, they resolved the following advocacy strategy:

- ❖ Advocate for proper management of states resources to ensure ARV access to all infected persons
- ❖ Decentralization of Government's functionaries so as to ensure equitable distribution of country's wealth
- ❖ Inspire, motivate and assist infected people engage in meaningful activities
- ❖ Knowledge of one's HIV/AIDS status through Voluntary Testing & Counseling Centers (VTCC), to ensure accurate statistical information and treatment for infected people

- ❖ Governments negotiate the readjustment of Structural Adjustment Program, (SAPs) by the IMF and World Bank on debt relief of Heavily Indebted and Poor Countries (HIPC)

4. Training of Female Trainers in Gender Advocacy Policy and Leadership

WSCF Africa Region organized training on Training of Female Trainers in Gender Advocacy Policy and Leadership. The training targeted 20 female participants from the Student Christian Movements (SCMs) of West Africa and Central Africa sub regions (both French speaking and English speaking). Ultimately participants drawn from the SCMs of Nigeria, Ghana, Benin, Ivory Coast, Togo, Cameroon, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Zimbabwe, Sudan, and Gambia, fully participated in the training.

This is part of the larger efforts of WSCF to equip and encourage young women to participate in addressing gender issues in Africa. The training therefore sought to;

- Empower women by providing them with information on their rights and enable them lead and to deliver where they are and in any other context
- Avail relevant UN and AU instruments and the Universal Declaration of Human rights, Convention for the Elimination of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW), the Beijing Platform of Action, Convention on the Rights of the Child, Protocol to the African Charter on Human and People's Rights on the rights of Women in Africa

The training was held in Accra, Ghana at the hotel Kumbaya from the 1st to the 4th of October 2007 and was hosted by the Female Student Commission (FSC) of Ghana.

At the end the workshop, participants indicated clearly that it was the first time they were given the right information and knowledge on gender and gender-related terminologies. Given women problems and the difficult context where women rights are still violated, they were not informed about the UN instruments on Women Rights. With the relevant information, they are well equipped to address with confidence women issues, their issues in their national movements, their churches and in their work places.

The UN instruments and other AU instruments on women's rights were distributed among members and it was the first time they were coming across these documents although they are available on internet. They also confessed they have read in the past some document on gender but did not fully understand all the concepts or what they stand for. Confusion was that Gender was a women-only issue. More copies will be distributed among members with the aim of grooming more women leaders and to prepare them to challenge the prevailing situation.

In addition the International declaration on Human rights was distributed to participants and the Convention for the Elimination of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW), The Beijing Platform of Action, Convention on the Rights of the Child, Protocol to the African Charter on Human and Peoples' rights on the rights of Women in Africa.

5. HIV and AIDS Sub Regional Training – Overcoming Stigmatization

From the 24th to the 30th November 2007, WSCF Africa Region conducted a sub regional training on HIV and AIDS- overcoming stigmatization in Kinshasa (DRC). The seminar was hosted by the Student Christian Movement of Congo (Federation Nationale des Jeunes Protestants). The seminar aims to strengthen the capacity of young members of WSCF engaged in the fight against HIV and AIDS for greater efficiency in their response to the pandemic. The specific objectives of the training were to:

- Strengthen the knowledge of our members on stigma and discrimination and to
- Strengthen the action of WSCF and our churches in the fight against Stigma and Discrimination.

A total of 21 student members of Christian Student Movements in the sub-region Central Africa of the following countries: Burundi, Cameroon, Madagascar, Democratic Republic of Congo, Rwanda attended the training.

Although in 2002 the International community chose to fight against stigmatization and discrimination, we have to recognize that stigmatization continues to undermine the efforts of fighting HIV and AIDS. Strategies to combat the HIV and AIDS are losing their effectiveness in an environment where human rights are not respected. For example, discrimination and stigmatization of vulnerable groups - This makes it more difficult to conduct preventive actions toward these populations and they become more vulnerable to HIV and AIDS. In the same way, neglecting access to education and information on HIV and AIDS, treatment and care services and support, it maintains the progression of the AIDS epidemic. It is necessary to take account of these elements if we are to respond effectively to HIV and AIDS, knowing that the non-observance of human rights is a hindrance to any effectiveness.

Human rights are inextricably linked to the spread and impact of HIV and AIDS on individuals and communities around the world. Failure to respect human rights helps to spread the disease and to exacerbate the impact at the same time as HIV and AIDS undermines progress in the implementation of human rights. The rights of people living with HIV and AIDS are often violated because of their presumed or known HIV status. These people are doubly penalized, on the one hand by the disease itself and by the loss that it brings to their other rights. Stigma and discrimination can block their access to treatment; affect their jobs, their homes and other rights. That, in turn, contributes to other risk both the stigma and discrimination that discourage people with HIV and those otherwise penalized because of the disease make themselves known to health services and social services. It follows that it is precisely those who have the greatest need to be informed, educated and counseled who are deprived of such services, even when they are available. The WSCF in its strategy of action against HIV and AIDS as a welcoming and compassionate community intends to tackle a stigma because we believe like other organizations, that if we want to win the fight against HIV and AIDS, you must start by eliminating stigma and discrimination.

At the end of the meeting one participant composes a song which will lead student in their actions against stigmatization and the main activities to carry to meet our goal are:

- Lobby our church leaders and decision making bodies of our churches
- Social mobilization of youth group, women, men, Christian organizations
- Improve communication for attitude change
- Involve more PLWH in all our actions
- Follow the example of the good Samaritan of the Bible

6. Improving Knowledge and Attitudes surrounding Sexuality, Reproductive Health & HIV and AIDS Prevention among the Youth

Today, a country's Knowledge levels and positive attitude on youth reproductive health, sexuality and HIV & AIDS prevention is definitely an indicator of the kind of future expected. In Kenya where the bulk of the population is the youth, calling for concerted efforts to aggressively address these crucial issues must be handled with a sense of priority and sobriety.

In response to the great cry for help, World Student Christian Federation (WSCF) Africa Region through funding from The Ford Foundation is working to improve knowledge surrounding sexuality, reproductive health, and HIV and AIDS prevention. The target group is the youth aged 15-24 years in Nairobi and Mombasa cities.

The challenging task of mobilizing the religious and academic communities around the vision, mission, and objectives of the project went on. Incidentally, among the faith communities, matters of sexuality, reproductive health, and HIV & AIDS are not readily discussed. The misconception is that arming the youth with information on the topics in question, they will seek to "experiment" or "misuse" this information. Nothing can be further from the truth. In total, about 30 institutions on learning and five religious groups were approached for partnership in trainings.

Three 5-days VF training targeting the Muslim women took place at the Jamia Mosque where a total of 23 VF trainers participated.

They were presented with clear and accurate information on youth sexuality, reproductive health and HIV/AIDS prevention.

Outreach work has been carried out at two levels namely:

Direct outreach- here, the office has worked hand in hand with the "core outreach team" to carry out teachings in identified institutions.

Indirect outreach –here, the Master Trainers and Volunteer Facilitators have been carrying out outreach work in their areas of operation independently, without necessarily requiring the direct input of the office.

We have interacted with hundreds of young persons to this year through the above stated routes.

A total of about 4000 youths have been reached through the direct outreach strategy in the following stations: Likoni high school, Likoni rehabilitation school, Waa boys high school, Matuga girls high school, St. Margaret Presbyterian Church, St. John Anglican Church, Kaya Tiwi Secondary School, Open youth forum at Shelly beach, Madaraka

primary school, Khalsa primary school, Moi equator girls high school, Pumwani primary school, Kongoni Primary school, Transition team, School of marital wisdom, Youth camp at Noonkopir girls primary school-Athi River, and youth group at Presbyterian guest house.

7. WSCF participation at the World Social Forum 2007, Nairobi, Kenya

The WSF is an annual meeting held by members of the anti-globalization movement to coordinate word campaigns, share and refine organizing strategies, and informs each other about movements from around the world and their issues. It tends to meet in January when its “great capitalist rival”, the World Economic Forum is meeting in Davos - Switzerland. From January 20th – 25th, 2007 the WSF was held in Africa for the first time.

WSCF booked an exhibition space and organized two activities: Seminar on “migration, a growing concern among the developing countries and “women, migration and Poverty”.

IV. MOVEMENTS BUILDING AND MOVEMENTS VISITATION

During the year, the Regional Secretary visited some movements. Most of the visit was initiated by the national movement itself. Movement building consisted of several key factors. One is to encourage and develop new leadership in the National Movements, in order to stay fresh and new, instead of growing older and becoming stagnant. Secondly, encourage the full and active participation of students in leadership involvement particularly the university students. In order to further foster the movements, there had to be a balance between the assistance of progress on one hand, and on the other, creating good administrative and a strong financial basis to enable them to carry out the intended progress. V. COLLABORATION WITH PARTNER ORGANISATIONS

0. *International Women's Summit: Women leadership on HIV and AIDS, World YWCA Council, July 2007*

From the 4th – 7th of July 2007 the World YWCA hosted an International conference on women and HIV and AIDS. WSCF Africa Region in collaboration with the African Population and Health Research Centre, Family Health International, Guttmacher Institute, I choose Life, Kenya Girl Guides Association, Kenya Red Cross, Kenya YMCA, Kenya YWCA, St Paul's Theological College and other Civil Society organization sponsored a meeting on Youth Sex and HIV on 7th of July. In order to reduce the rate of HIV infections in Kenya, young people needs facts, skills, resources, access to health care and to be treated with respect and dignity. Young people have the creativity, energy and capacity to be equal partners in HIV prevention. Mr. Mbutu Kariuki, WSCF Africa Project Coordinator of HIV & AIDS represented WSCF at the meeting.

1. *Consultative Workshop : Women of Africa Leadership Development Program, October 23, 2007 Nairobi*

The Nairobi Peace Initiative – Africa (NPI-A) in partnership with the Leadership Wisdom Initiative (LWI) at Search for Common Ground (SFCG) organized a half day consultative workshop on Women of Africa Leadership Development Program. WSCF Regional Secretary took part at the consultation.

Cognizant of some of the challenges leaders face, the objective of the consultative workshop was to collectively explore current opportunities and barriers for the inclusion, advancement and continuation of women's participation in democratic decision making, and what is needed to support women's leadership development. The initiative seeks to support women leaders as they take the next step in their leadership journey, expanding their ability to influence change in their current positions. The consultation also creates the space and opportunity for renowned leaders in Kenya to reflect on their experience and wisdom gained in the context of practical engagement with the situations they deal with every day.

2. *WCC AGAPE Consultation on Wealth Creation, Poverty and Ecology in Africa, Dar Es Salaam 5-9 November 2007*

The World Council of Churches (WCC) organized in Dar Es Salaam from the 5th to the 9th of November 2007 a Consultation on Wealth Creation, Poverty and Ecology in Africa. The consultation is part of a series of consultations (termed church encounters) planned to take place in other continents from now till 2011.

The Dar Es Salaam consultation was a continuation of the Alternative Globalization Addressing People and Earth (AGAPE) process which began at the WCC General Assembly held in Harare in 1998, culminating in the AGAPE Call presented at the General Assembly in Porto Alegre in 2006.

The AGAPE Call invites churches to act together for transformation of socio-economic injustice and to continue analyzing, reflecting and acting on the challenges posed by economic globalization and the links between poverty, wealth and ecology. In discussing poverty, wealth and ecology, eight actions have been outlined, namely: **poverty eradication, trade, finance, sustainable use of land and natural resources, public goods and services, life-giving agriculture, decent jobs, emancipated work and people's livelihoods, and churches and the power of empire.** While the ecumenical family has acknowledged that poverty and inequality are pressing concerns and that environmental destruction is escalating, there is an urgent need to build and strengthen consensus on the causes of and ways to deal with these interlinked crises.

The consultation has the following objectives:

1. To share church perspectives and practices on the causes of and ways of tackling poverty, inequality, and environmental destruction;
2. To discuss a theological base for studying the links between poverty, wealth and ecology in the context of the AGAPE process and the International Ecumenical Peace Convocation;
3. To discuss the findings of the Study on Poverty, Wealth and Ecology in Africa and outline benchmarks for establishing a “greed line” in Africa as a guidance to Christians;
4. To discuss the perspectives of women and youth on the links between poverty, wealth and ecology in Africa; and
5. To come up with joint church strategies and actions for addressing the interlinked problems of poverty, excessive wealth, and ecological degradation in Africa.

Georgine Kengne Djeutane, Regional Secretary of WSCF Africa was the team leader of the Youth Hearing. At the end of the Hearing, African Young persons issued a Statement in which they unanimously commit to overcome all forms of injustice and promote AGAPE (alternative globalization addressing people and earth).

3. Global Christian Forum Conference, Kenya, Limuru Jumuia Conference & Country home 6th -9th November 2007

A Global Christian Forum conference on “our Journey with Jesus Christ the reconciler” took place at Limuru, Kenya. Christians from different denominations and organizations in Africa and Europe took part at the conference. WSCF Africa Region was represented at the Forum by the Administrative and Finance Assistant.

- The Forum creates different opinions from different kind of people world wide. This means that God sees how we cry and suffer due to this, He is concerned and that is why He is creating unity among his people.

- With the unity among the entire people world wide, a lot of things can be solved in a very short time. The Unity creates love and peace and it makes those who don't know each other to get to know each other.

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Understanding faith, patience and love will create unity worldwide! May Lord bind us together to be a united world.

4. AACC & SECAM consultation process towards a joint EU- Africa Strategy, Accra 12-13 November 2007

The All Africa Conference of Churches & the Symposium of Episcopal Conference in Africa and Madagascar organized a consultation process towards a joint EU-Africa Strategy. The Regional Secretary attended the meeting.

The objectives of the meeting were:

- Inclusion of the Ecumenical voice in the EU Africa Strategy
- Critical examination of the needs and aspirations of the church in Africa for inclusion in the strategy
- Examining the key issues that pertain to the present and future relationships between the EU and the Africa Union: Poverty, agriculture, international migration, international trade, climate change, peace and human security, HIV and AIDS and other killer diseases, development assistance, governance and debt.
- Development of a way forward for the engagement of the churches in the continent in the strategy and statement
- Appointment of a delegation to present the African Church position in the Lisbon Summit

The delegates at the meeting issued at the end a statement of Churches on the EU-Africa Strategy Addressing Heads of State and Governments in Africa, the Africa Union and the European Union.

5. UCC Canada Partners Meeting, Nairobi 17-18 December 2008

The United Church of Canada organized the partners meeting to discuss recent developments in the priorities and plans of the UCC that will have implications for partners. UCC priorities vision is to build on stronger relations with partners, strong congregations and strong ministry leadership, to guide towards strengthening the intercultural character of the church and support within the UCC finding true places for youth and young adults.

The reduction of partner grants will be effective from 2009 budget. UCC will not deduct any WSCF fund agreement. We thank UCC for their constant support.

Ms Wendy Gichuru shared with us resource kit initiated by UCC on United for Peace Campaign which is active since November 2007 up to December 2009. Mr. Maxwell Omondi represented WSCF Africa at the meeting.

VI. INSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

During the Officers and Staff meeting in Geneva, WSCF Regional Secretaries were trained on record management. The purpose of the training was to help the staff control the creation, storage and length of time needed to keep our records, to ensure that valuable records are protected. The Regional Secretary worked with an Intern to consolidate records inventory of the region. Each copy of historical material was transferred to Yale University.

WSCF Africa region enhanced skills of two of the staff. The Administrative and Finance Assistant was trained in finance and the support staff on computer literacy.

VII. COMMUNICATION

Since 2005, WSCF is producing a compiled annual report which is disseminated to the partners, SCMerS and others Civil Society Organizations. We are also producing an electronic Newsletter which is sent to our members worldwide.

VIII. CONCLUSION

It is only with faith that most of the activities were carried.
